ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday starts on the same day as Lent does — March 5, 2025. We should start preparing for it. But, what happens on Ash

Wednesday, you may ask? Well, the people will form a line in between the pews, and will receive ash in the shape of a cross on their foreheads from the pastor. The pastor will say, “Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.”

Lent came first, its 40 days mirroring Biblical events like Jesus’s time in the desert. Easter’s date was fixed in 325 AD, but Lent’s start wasn’t set until 601 AD — when Ash Wednesday was also first observed. The ashes represent repentance and mortality, and are made from burned palms from the previous Palm Sunday, linking Lent to Holy Week.

Ash Wednesday is soon. We should start getting ready the same way we should be getting ready for Lent: Praying, growing our faith and love for God, following the 10 commandments, reading the bible, sharing the word of the Gospel, and so much more.

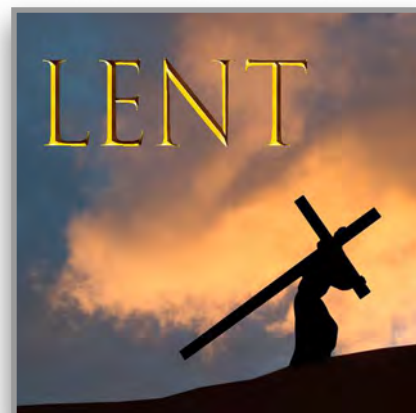
Lent

In the next month, March, Lent will start—specifically on March 5, 2025. Lent is a season of the church year that follows the Epiphany Season. There are two guiding rules: the baptized should grow their faith and love to Jesus, and we should be humble, while simultaneously maintaining a hopeful focus on God’s triumph celebrated at Easter. The purpose of Lent is to prepare for Easter through prayer and self-discipline.

Lent, which is the 40 days before Easter, began after 325 AD. It had started as a time of fasting for new Christians before their Easter baptism. Everyone in the church observed it, soon. The exact length and rules varied, until Pope Gregory I standardized it around 600 AD. The Pope set the start as Ash Wednesday — 46 days before Easter (excluding Sundays), with a daily fast until after 3 p.m., avoiding meat, fish, and dairy.

Lent will be starting soon. Make sure to keep praying, greater your faith and love to God, read the Bible, follow the ten commandments and also spread the Gospel!

Pokemon Day is the day that Pokemon announces everything new for their video games and card games. We will talk about when it will happen, why we started it, and what we can expect this year.

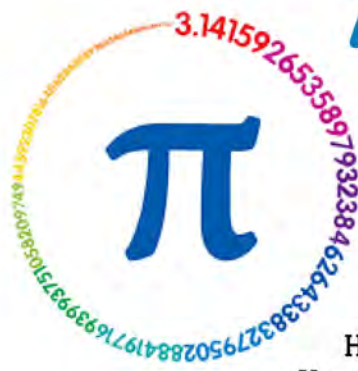

THE MILKY WAY GALAXY

Have you ever heard of the Milky Way? The Milky Way is the galaxy our solar system is inside. The Milky Way is a barred spiral. It was at first thought of as a spiral galaxy but after further study it was revealed to be a barred spiral galaxy.

Did you know there are no real photos of the Milky Way. They are just illustrations. The galaxy is way too large for us to be able to get that far away to get a big enough picture. We physically cannot get a photo yet because it would take around 35,000 years to get out of the Milky Way Galaxy and even longer to get far enough away to get a full frame photo. We

know what they look like because of telescopes.

Fun Facts:

- According to our current scientific understanding there is a supermassive black hole at almost every large galaxy, including ours.
- The Milky Way has about 300 billion stars.
- The Milky Way Galaxy is considered a medium sized galaxy compared to other galaxies.
- The Milky Way is a twisted shape at both ends and is not actually a straight line like most pictures depict.
- It rotates at a speed of 155 miles per second around its center.

Size:

The Milky Way is about 1,000,000,000,000,000 km, 621371192237333900 miles, or 100,000 light years across. The sun does not lie near the center of the galaxy.

No one and nothing has ever left the Milky Way. The farthest probe we have sent which took almost 50 years to get to its location of 162 astronomical units was Voyager 1. An astronomical unit is the average distance between earth and the Sun. This is not even 0.002 light years from the inner solar system. Hypothetically it would take voyager 1 468 million years to travel to the center of the galaxy. It would take almost 1.9 billion years to cover the distance of the width. The solar system occupies a very small percentage of the Milky Way Galaxy. It is estimated to be less than 0.001% of its total volume.

The Milky Way Galaxy will collide with its nearest neighbor, the Andromeda Galaxy, in about four billion years. They are currently hurtling toward each other at 250,000 miles an hour. Earth will likely survive and very few stars will actually be destroyed and instead the newly formed mega galaxy will offer a night skyscape with a spectacular blend of stars unlike anything we can see today. I hope you learned something about our galaxy, the Milky Way

DID YOU KNOW? The Milky Way candy bar was created in 1923 by Frank C. Mars in Minneapolis, Minnesota. It was named after a popular malted milk drink of the time, not the galaxy.

Unlike most other whales, the Beluga has a very flexible neck that enables it to nod and turn its head in all directions. Beluga whales are mammals. Their diet is carnivorous, which means they eat meat. A group of Belugas is called a pod. They can live up to 35 to 50 years in the wild.

These creatures can grow to be 13 to 20 feet long and their weight can log in between one and to one and a half tons. The Beluga, also known as the White Whale, is one of the smallest species of whale. Their distinctive color and prominent

foreheads make them easily identifiable. Belugas are social animals and vocal communicators using a diversified language of clicks, whistles, and clangs. Belugas can also copy a variety of other sounds. The whale is related to the tusked "unicorn" whale known as the Narwhal.

In our chapel service on January 22, 2025, there was a visitor who was the father of one of Trinity's students. Mr. Camiola, or what others call him in Africa, Coach, came to tell us about his ministry. He is from New York and grew up in a family that didn't follow Jesus, but he devoted his life to Jesus at age 17 and now calls Jos, Nigeria, his home.

At the moment Africa is the fourth most populated continent, and by the end of the century it will become the second most populated country. There are 54 countries according to some people but there could also be 55 or 56 depending on the person you ask. Mr. Camiola talked about how long it takes him to get to Jos, Nigeria, which is around a full day and a couple hours to get there. In Nigeria Mr. Camiola has opened a cafe, a school that teaches about God, a garden, and so much more.

In Jos, Nigeria, where the Camiola family has their ministry there are rocks that are cool looking (see photo of Riyom Rock above). In 20 years it will be the fourth most populous place in Africa. They do not have lions, giraffes, or zebras in Nigeria. Mr. Camiola was born into a Mafia family. Mr. Camiola came to Christ at seventeen years old. Has eight children, four biological and four adopted. In Nigeria the teachers can hit the children for discipline, in order to counter that the Camiola family has been running one Christian school and will soon open another. The Camiolas have also opened a coffee shop, and other businesses to help provide jobs for people in Jos.

John Camiola and his wife operate a ministry. They work to help Nigerians in Nigeria. Here is more about John Camiola.

His wife's name is Missy (also known as Melissa). They have eight different children, four children are biological, and four children are adopted. The town he lives in inside of Nigeria is called Jos, which means Jesus Our Savior. They have created a lot of jobs for people in Jos, training people to be tailors, running a baking school, a coffee shop (see photo of Tin City Cafe below), and a Christian school.

What we found really interesting is that John Camiola's dad was part of the Italian Mafia!

John's wears a long beard, because he will look like a Muslim and blend in when he travels to northern Nigeria. Otherwise it would be unsafe for him in that part of Nigeria, where there is a lot kidnapping and killing.

John Camiola is a ministry worker who serves in Nigeria. Why Nigeria?

In 2005, he and his wife went on a short-term mission trip to Nigeria. They loved it - and missions. When they went on the trip, they met nice people and decided to move there.

They got approval to open a safe house for victims of human trafficking. It was a facility to house and protect girls and women and teach them life skills (see photo of Grace Gardens at left).

They've lived in Nigeria since 2009. They live and work in Jos (Jesus Our Savior) with the goal of showing the love of Christ in their community.

James 2:14-17 inspires the Camiolas' heart for ministry. They believe that God's love compels us to love others.

The Camiolas serve as missionaries in Jos, Nigeria, and are committed to rescuing women and children from human trafficking and providing relief for persecuted Christians.

On January 22, 2025, Mr. Camiola came to our school to talk about and present his ministry. Even though he was born in New York, and is half Italian and half Spanish, he calls Jos, Nigeria, in Africa, his home – and he told us how Africa does not have much wildlife.

Jos stands for "Jesus Our Savior." Mr. Camiola, or Coach, wants to share the Gospel and help people in need. In Nigeria, the unemployment rate is 70%. Fun fact, Africa will be the fourth most populated continent in the world, and by the end of the century, it will be the second most populated continent.

Sadly, they also have the highest rate of human trafficking. Mr. Camiola helps people with small business setups, has a baking school, teaches people how to tend to crops in Grace Gardens, with 30 green houses that feed people, and even teaches widows and other women some skills they might need to live on.

The Camiola family had a short-term mission trip to Nigeria in 2005, and Mr. Camiola was amazing at relating with the children. Mr. and Mrs. Camiola have eight children – four children being biological, and four children being adopted.

Many children in Nigerian schools are typically hit or beaten by teachers. Mr. Camiola's wife, Mrs. Camiola, didn't like this, for obvious reasons. As a result, she decided to open a school called Grace and Hope American Academy (see photo at right), which has books from the United States.

Mrs. Camiola is not a teacher, but she serves as an administrator in charge of the other teachers – and makes sure they are doing their jobs. In August, a new school will be set up for six hundred children. This new school will be nine hours away from where the Camiolas live. Both schools intentionally teach about Jesus and preach the Gospel. Mr. Camiola was not born in a Christian household but committed to Christ as a junior in high school.

We were all very happy and excited to learn about Mr. Camiola's ministry. At the end, he gave all of us a Nigerian bill! We would need 15,000 of those bills for it to equal a dollar.

During chapel service, Coach C came to Trinity and told us about Nigeria and what it is like to live there. He told us some funny things, like how people find his beard scary, and some interesting facts about him and his life, like how he has eight children, four biological children and four adopted children (*see family photo at left*). One of them even comes to our school (*see photo of Joshua below*)!

Coach C's parents were both immigrants, and his father was in the Italian Mafia. Which would make you think he would have a pretty strange life, or have connections to dangerous ties, but he is actually a very interesting person.

Coach C owns 33 houses where he farms, grows food, and more. He absolutely loves farming, and he considers his staff as extended family, because they all are close and work together so well. Coach feels like it's his job to spread the Gospel. Coach also owns 25 companies in total.

Coach C runs a bakery in Nigeria called the "Tin City Bakery." He even started a baking school. He loves taking care of people and being a good person. He takes care of ex-human trafficking victims and introduces them to God and Christianity. And in Nigeria, it is dangerous during the night, due to the very high rate of human trafficking/kidnapping.

Schools in Nigeria usually allow hitting the students for discipline, but Coach C didn't think that this was an appropriate form of education and discipline, so he started his own school. Coach C and his wife operate a Christian school in Nigeria where they don't allow any sort of physical punishment, which is rare to find in Africa. He also uses books for education, whereas other schools in Nigeria make students just go off of memory.

One startling fact about Africa is that 25% of the population is in Nigeria! And Africa is made up of mostly Muslims and Christians in its 54 countries. Africa is home to some unique and interesting natural rock structures and there are some very dramatic ones in Jos, Nigeria, where Coach C lives. Despite the popular idea of African safaris, Africa isn't really a heavily animal-populated place, as the people have eaten much of the animal wildlife.

Nigeria is not perfect. Many people, including children, are beaten, or sold into slavery. And as mentioned before, there's a high rate of kidnapping and child trafficking that takes place during the evening hours. People are sometimes so fanatically religious there; they would even kill people of another religion for being in their territory. (Hopefully, Christians would not do this!)
