1. Trinity Lutheran School's Girls' Volleyball Chargers won the Lutheran Sports Association Illinois State Championship in **2000**.

3. **Twelve** farm families founded Trinity Lutheran School. The land was from their farms and some of the nearby streets still bear the names of those families.

7. The original Trinity schoolhouse had only **one** classroom.
8. New buildings were added to the school in **1946 and 1975**. Also, two preschool rooms and the office corridor were added to the main building in 1988.

Coming Up: Columbus Day

Columbus Day is observed on October 13, 2025. The day was first celebrated in 1792 in New York to mark the 300th anniversary of Columbus's landing in the Americas. It became a federal holiday in the United States in 1937.

Christopher Columbus was born in 1451 and died in 1506. He was born in Italy, and despite wide belief that he was Italian, he was possibly ethnically Spanish and Jewish. Columbus was a devoted Christian whose haste to spread the Gospel spurred his travels across the ocean to the yet undiscovered New World.

Columbus made four voyages in his time, first venturing to the Americas at the age of 41. His strict administration of government in the New World led to his arrest. He was sent to Spain for trial and eventually acquitted.

His ships travelled approximately 150 miles a day. His first voyage of 3,000 miles took 50 days to reach the Americas from Europe.



History of Constitution Day

Constitution Day [September 17] is the celebration of the United States Constitution which was established as a national observance in 2004 by Senator Robert Byrd to increase public knowledge about the document.

The Constitution was created to replace the Articles of Confederation and amend its weaknesses. The government, under the articles, couldn't control commerce or effectively raise revenue, which pointed the states toward economic disaster. There was also a need for a stronger Union.

The United States Constitution was signed by the delegates on September 17, 1787, at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Prominent figures among the signers included George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Hamilton, and James Madison. Not all delegates signed; some refused to sign the Constitution as originally drafted.

The Constitution of the United States of America is our supreme law. (In other words, it is our most important regulation). The Constitution institutes the three branches of the government, what makes up our government, and what all our state laws are founded on.

The Constitution was written on paper with ink - the paper was made from wood fibers and used paper pounded into a pulp, then set in water to form a solid mat from which the water is pressed out and then heated to set.

"This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding."

The First Amendment states that "congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances." Christianity is a religion, and the First Amendment gives us the freedom of religion, but what exactly does this mean? Well, without the First Amendment, Congress could say, "you can't practice religion, or you'll be put to death." Because of the First Amendment, you're able to practice whatever religion you want, whether that is Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, or any other belief. As Christians we are free to be Christians, and Congress can't tell us otherwise.



Not only are we free to practice the religion we choose, we are free to talk about it. Under our First Amendment right, our freedom of speech is protected. We can go out and spread the Gospel to others. Other religions can do the same, and Congress cannot prohibit us from doing so.

Floyd, the Trinity student, answered a few questions about his father:

Timothy Botts is an artist who has a focus on calligraphy. He was born in Pennsylvania and currently resides in Glen Ellyn, Illinois. He is well known for his transformation of Bible verses into pieces of art.

Tim Botts is a master calligrapher who studied graphic design and calligraphy at Carnegie-Mellon University. He and his wife Nancy spent three years in Japan teaching conversational English where, after graduation, he was introduced to the rich brush writing tradition of the East.



Later, Tim started a forty-year career at Tyndale House Publishers designing books and Bibles and retired as senior art director in 2012. He also teaches calligraphy part time at College of DuPage in Glen Ellyn, Illinois and has taught numerous workshops throughout the United States and internationally.

Tim's work is part of the permanent collection of the Newberry Library in Chicago. Ten books of his work have been published, including **Doorposts**, **Messiah**, **The Botts Illustrated Bible**, and **Bound for Glory**.

Tim says of his own work, "I aim to make the words look like what they mean, always trying to strike a balance between legibility and expression. Making these word pictures is, for me as a visual person, the strongest way to reflect on God's Word. To share them with others is an additional joy."

His work is a part of the permanent collection of the Newberry Library in Chicago. Ten books of his work have been published, which include **Doorposts**, **Messiah**, **The Botts Illustrated Bible**, and **Bound for Glory**.

In speaking about faith and the art of calligraphy, the internationally acclaimed artist has said, "Calligraphy has had an important and significant role in preserving and celebrating the Bible and can convey truth in deep and profound ways." He also finds connection between how God shows Himself in Jesus and how we can visualize spiritual wisdom through word pictures.


Trinity is collecting the following school supplies for Liberian Children's Ministry until September 29:


