


PRESIDENTS' DAY by Ariana Mehrazar

The story of Presidents' Day begins in 1800. Surprisingly, four United States Presidents have birthdays in February: George Washington (22nd), Abraham Lincoln (12th), William Henry Harrison (9th), and Ronald Reagan (6th). Some people may celebrate these birthdays, but most people don't know these

The story of Presidents' Day began in 1800...

Following the death of George Washington in 1799, February 22 (his birthday), became a perennial day of remembrance. At the time, Washington


was venerated as the most important figure in American history, and events like the 1832 centennial of his birth and the start of construction of the Washington Monument in 1848 were cause for national celebration. In 1862,

CHAP. 38.—An act to amend section unne hundred and ninety-three of the Revised Jan. 31, 1879. Statutes of the United States for the District of Columbia, so as to make the twentysecond day of February a isoliday within said District.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section nine hundred and ninety-three of the Revised Statutes of the United States relating to the District of Columbia be, and the same hereby is, amended by adding to the days therein declared to be holidays within the District the twenty-second day of February; and such day shall be a holiday for all the purposes mentioned in said section: Provided, That this act shall not apply to the twenty-second day of February, eighteen hundred and seventy-nine. Approved, January 31, 1879.

Lincoln issued a proclamation declaring February 22 a day of celebration honoring Washington.


A federal holiday on February 22 was officially passed into law in 1879. Above is an excerpt from the Revised Statutes of the Forty-Fifth Congress. Presidents' Day is recognized as honoring George Washington and Abraham Lincoln. We should all honor Presidents' Day, and as well, we should honor all four (former) Presidents.



THE ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT ABRAHAM LIN(OLN

The happiness of a Union victory in America's War Between the States (the Civil War) came to a sudden halt on the night of April 14, 1865, when President Abraham Lincoln was shot while attending a play at Ford's Theatre in Washington, DC, while watching My American Cousin. As the president lay dying in a house across the street from the theater, Senator Charles Sumner appeared at his bedside. Then on April 14, 1865, our 16th President, Abraham Lincoln died at 56 years old. The person that killed him was John Wilkes Booth, who was mad that Lincoln had ended slavery.

Abraham Lincoln was the 16th President of the United States. He is known for abolishing slavery. Earlier generations of his family migrated west from Massachusetts, west passing through states like New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Virginia.

Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809, in Kentucky. His father moved the family to Indiana, where he lived from the age of 7 through 21. In Illinois, the "Land of Lincoln," he married and entered politics. All three states claim Lincoln as their native son.

When Lincoln was 9 years old, his mother died from milk sickness leaving the young Abraham and his older sister, Sarah, alone with their widowed father. Thomas Lincoln remarried a year later. Ten years later, at age 21, Sarah died giving birth, and Lincoln was devastated.

A fun fact about Lincoln is that he was mostly self-educated. As a teen, he was responsible for many chores.

His faith

Abraham Lincoln did not belong to any church but did get most of his knowledge from the Bible. When he read aloud or just in general, his writing very often included a Bible verse. He was known as the "First Evangelical President."

As Lincoln grew up, he was raised in a very religious Baptist family. He was seen attending church with his family when he got older. Abraham didn't, and would probably never, disrespect scripture. He said that he was inspired and influenced by it. Abraham Lincoln accepted God's Word and followed it. He used it often in his speaking.

Lincoln's Words About God and the Bible

"I can see how it might be possible for a man to look down upon the earth and be an atheist, but I cannot conceive how a man could look up into the heavens and say there is no God."

"We pray for God's guidance through the storm of conflict, for His wisdom in the search for peace, for His mercy and forgiveness toward all men, friend and foe."

"In regard to this Great Book (the Bible), I have but to say, it is the best gift God has given to man. All



the good the Savior gave to the world was communicated through this Book."

"My concern is not whether God is on our side; my greatest concern is to be on God's side, for God is always right."

General Washington's efforts and the work of this first American intelligence community were critical to the Continental Army's victory over the British. They established a strong tradition of intelligence collection and innovation that still remains important to our nation's security today.

Ballet is a form of dance that originated in the Italian Renaissance courts of the 15th century. Noblemen and women were treated to lavish events, especially wedding celebrations, where dancing and music created an elaborate spectacle. The first ballerina was Mademoiselle De Lafontaine. She was born in 1655 and died in 1738 (at the age of 83). Ballet is not pronounced the way that it's spelled, it's pronounced: balle (or bal-ay).

You may not know this about me, but I've been dancing since I was 18 months old. And, I have mostly done ballet. Some people confuse ballet with lyrical dance, and lyrical is jazz AND ballet. Lyrical is more of a contemporary style,
