



About Advent by Abigail Pilny

Advent takes place in the time before Christmas. It lasts four weeks and four Sundays. This year the Fourth Sunday of Advent is actually on Christmas Eve. Advent is a season that we celebrate, knowing Jesus is coming. In our school, we have about one hour of church instead of 40 minutes of chapel. There is an Advent wreath with candles. The pink candle stands for joy (and is first lit on the Third Sunday of Advent), one of the blue candles stands for hope, another blue candle symbolizes preparation, the last blue candle stands for

love, and the white candle (often called the Christ candle) stands for purity, regeneration, godliness, light and victory. Advent is the first season of the church year, just like January is the first month of the calendar year. Each year, it begins the church calendar, you get through it and you start all over again.

From the Latin word for "coming," Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation for the coming if Christ both in the past in His incarnation as the baby Jesus, but also in the future with His promised second coming as Christ Triumphant. Furthermore, Advent is a time to focus on His present coming to us in the Word and Sacraments. - LCMS.org

Christmas is very popular in Japan, many Japanese people make it a tradition to eat fried chicken. It is also seen as a couples day rather than a day for family, many couples can be seen going on dates or taking walks. There is generally no connection to Christianity or the birth of the Christ Child.

On Christmas Eve, in Poland, the Poles don't eat or drink alcohol and it is tradition to fast on Christmas Eve. The Polish faithful put hay under their tablecloths to represent Jesus' birth in a manger.

In Germany, families gather around the table for a heart warming meal, attend church, the children will play with their new toys, and they will light the last candle on the Advent wreath.



On the eve of Saint Nicholas Day, December 6, in Holland, children leave out carrots and hay in their wooden shoes then go to sleep. The next morning the carrots and hay in the shoes have been replaced with toys and candy. To the glee of the Dutch children, Saint Nicholas has also placed toys and candy in tiny hiding places in the house (including their shoes)!

In China, Christmas is more commercialized because it is new holiday from the west and doesn't have the religious cultural significance that it does in most of Europe. The commercialism drives people to go to stores and buy things. Most Chinese people do not know about the real meaning of Christmas but they do celebrate it.

Christmas Crafts by Roscoe Barnett

Christmas crafts eliminate any opportunity to be bored. They bring out creativity and can be really cool and fun. Even very active people can enjoy time to relax with crafts. It's a great activity to do while spending time with friends.

Sock Snowman

Materials:

- 1 white men's sock
- 1 patterned or colored sock
- 3 cups uncooked rice
- rubber bands
- hot glue gun
- glue sticks for glue gun
- funnel
- cotton swab (q-tip)

- fabric scissors (or kitchen shears)
- 2 tiny black buttons or beads
- 1 small piece of orange pipe cleaner (chenille stem)
- small accent buttons
- fabric or ribbon for scarf
- 1 mini pom-pom or cotton ball
- powdered blush or pink chalk



Instructions

1. Use fabric scissors to cut straight across the white sock under the heel. Keep the bottom portion and discard the top. Turn sock inside out.

2. Place funnel inside the sock, then add about 3 cups of uncooked rice inside the sock. Plop the sock down a few times to stretch it out to fit more rice inside. This will make the snowman nice and plum and firm. Close off the top with a rubber band, then use another rubber band to create the head. Trim the excess sock from the top if necessary.

3. Cut a few inches off from the toe of a pattern or colored sock to make the hat. Cut another straight line just underneath the heel of the same sock to make the sweater. Place the hat on the snowman's head and the sweater on its' body.

4. With an adult's help, use hot glue to hold the hat and sweater in place, then add pom-pom to the top of the hat.

5. Hot glue two tiny black buttons to make the snowman's eyes. Cut a small piece of orange pipe cleaner, then use hot glue to press it into the sock for the snowman's nose. If you'd like your snowman to have rosy cheeks, dip a cotton swab into pink blush and gently press it onto the snowman's cheeks.

6. Hot glue buttons onto the snowman's sweater. For a scarf, then cut a long strip of fabric or ribbon, tie it around your snowman's neck and hot glue in place. Use scissors to create fringe on the scarf ends.

December has now started, and in my house, it's the start of Christmas. We put up decorations, get cozy, but most importantly - we watch Christmas movies!



All these movies and many more are good to enjoy a happy and cozy holiday with laughter and fun.




THE RED PLANET by Ava Harrison


You may be wondering, what is the fifth planet? Well, the short answer to that is Jupiter. Jupiter is the fifth planet in our beautifully created solar system. Jupiter is so interesting and cool to learn about and I hope you feel the same way. First you should know what is inside Jupiter. Most of the planet consists of hydrogen in gaseous, liquid, and metallic form, although there is a small, rocky core. The atmosphere is mainly hydrogen, with some helium, plus traces of methane and ammonia. One interesting feature of Jupiter

is The Great Red Spot. Have you ever heard of the famous red spot? It is a big red spot on Jupiter, or really a storm compacted of pressure. Lying in the south tropical zone, the Great Red Spot is a giant storm, some 40,000 kilometers across - three times the size of Earth. Within this area of high pressure inward-spiraling winds carry gasses to great heights in the atmosphere, where they react with sunlight. Jupiter was fun for us to learn about and we hope it was for you too.

NEPTUNE by Ava Harrison

Have you ever heard of Neptune, also known as Poseidon? Does the name Poseidon sound familiar? Poseidon or Neptune was the Roman god of the sea. Neptune is named after the that mythological god because of its blue color, like the sea. But why is it blue? Methane is

responsible for the blue color of the planet. This is because methane in gaseous form absorbs all the red wavelengths from the sun and only reflects blue wavelengths. The atmosphere on Neptune is mainly hydrogen, helium, and methane. The picture at right shows Neptune and its six known rings.



Parent Alert from Trinity Lutheran Board of Education

As you may have heard, we are beginning to see cases of the COVID-19 virus. If your child tests "positive" for the COVID virus, please consider following these guidelines:

1. Notify the school office immediately.

2. *Have your child begin a 5-day isolation at home.

3. *If, after 5 days, your child's symptoms ARE improving and he/she has been fever free for 24 hours (without the use of fever-reducing medication), your child can end isolation and return to school. Masking during days 6-10 is suggested but NOT required by Trinity Lutheran School.

4. *If, after 5 days, your child's symptoms are NOT

improving, continue to isolate until your child is fever free for 24 hours (without the use of fever-reducing medication) and symptoms improve.

*These guidelines are suggested by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, the Illinois Department of Public Health, and the Illinois State Board of Education.






