

Martin Luther King, Jr. & Martin Luther

by Damian Gomez and Francesco Lamphere Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a black freedomist who desired equality for all people. An ordained minister and son of a Baptism preacher, King embraced peaceful protest and wanted a world that would be free from racism. He dreamed

that his kids would live in harmony with people that are of a different race. He was named after his dad who took the name of Martin Luther following his recognition of his redemption at a church retreat. As a Christian, Martin Luther King, Jr., called upon God. He is known best for his inspirational leadership in the civil rights movement. He led people to stand bravely, making a difference, to let their voices be heard.

The Great Reformer, who name King bore, Martin Luther, was an energetic 33-year-old Augustinian friar, hammering his 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church at Wittenberg, in Saxony, and thus, eventually, splitting the thousand-year-old Roman Catholic Church into two churches. One church body remaining loyal to the Pope in Rome, the other protesting against the Pope's rule and soon, in fact, calling itself Protestant. October 2024 marks the 507th anniversary of Luther's famous action. Accordingly, a number of books have come out, reconsidering the man and his influence. They differ on many points, but something that most of them pose is that the hammering episode, so symbolically loud, metallic, and violent, never occurred. Not only were there no witnesses, but Luther himself, ordinarily an enthusiastic self-dramatizer, was vague on what had happened. He remembered drawing up a list of 95 Theses around the date in guestion, but, as for what he did with it, all he was sure of was that he sent it to the local archbishop. Furthermore, the theses were not, as is often imagined, a set of non-negotiable demands about how the Church should reform itself in accordance with Brother Martin's standards. Rather, they were points to be discussed. Despite the deniers and regardless of the chain of events, Luther's queries began the movement which became the Reformation that changed the world.

year on January 1, the Roman Catholic Pope marks the World Day of Peace with a special message inviting all people to reflect on the important work of building peace. World Day of Peace has been established by the United Nations General Assembly, and is dedicated to promoting peace within communities, strengthening the ideals of peace, and fostering a culture of non-violence and ceasefire across the globe. Maybe today isn't World Day of Peace, but that doesn't mean we shouldn't even *try* to be peaceful.
