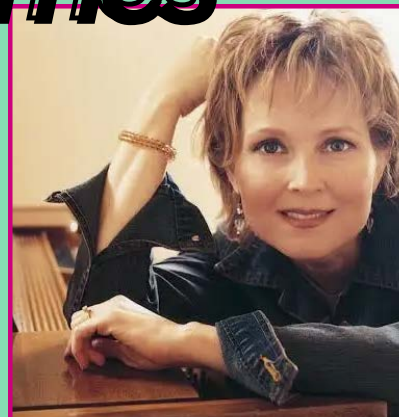

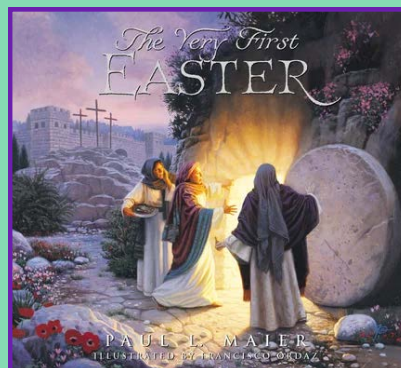
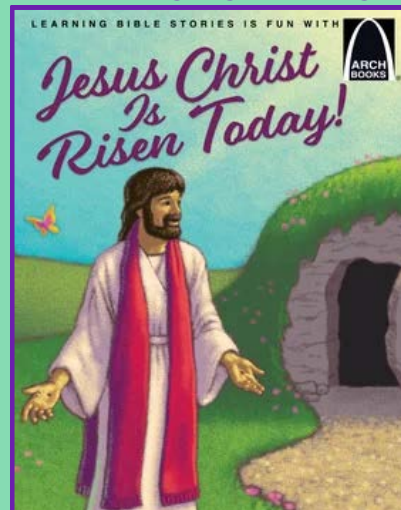

Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday occurs on March 29, 2026, which marks the Sunday before Easter and celebrates Jesus's triumphant, yet humble, entry into

Jerusalem. Christians celebrate this day by waving palm branches to symbolize the crowd's welcome of Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem as recorded in Matthew 21.

According to the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey while people laid cloaks and branches on the road (like a red carpet). They did this while shouting "Hosanna," which means save us. Palm branches signify victory, triumph, and kingship. The donkey symbolizes humility and peace. The occurrence fulfilled the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9, which foretold that the Messiah would arrive as a lowly King.

In Palm Sunday church services, the day begins with the blessing of palm branches, which in many churches, follows a procession. Many Christians take the blessed palm branches home as a sign of blessing—often crafting them into small crosses.

The palms blessed on this day are often burned to create the ashes for Ash Wednesday the following year.

Palm Sunday is a very important holiday. It celebrates the start of Holy Week, and there is a lot of symbolism. How do you plan to celebrate Palm Sunday?

Holy Week

Holy Week is the week between Palm Sunday and Easter. This year that runs from Palm Sunday on March 29 to Easter Sunday on April 5, 2026. In addition to Palm Sunday and Easter, this includes Maundy Thursday [April 2], Good Friday [April 3], and Holy Saturday [April 4].

Palm Sunday celebrates Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, which is the event that begins Holy Week. Many worshippers commemorate this occasion by waving palm branches and shouting "Hosanna," attempting to recreate the original crowd's cheerful welcome of Jesus.

Maundy Thursday marks the end of Lent. The name is derived from the Latin word for "commandment" and honors Jesus's instruction to "love one another." Worshipers receive individual absolution, which mirrors Ash Wednesday's ashes. This service also remembers the Last Supper and Jesus washing His disciples' feet.

Good Friday is a somber service, celebrating Jesus's crucifixion and sacrifice for humanity's sins. It's a day of reflection and humility, marked by the absence of Holy Communion—as it represents the breaking of Jesus's body on the cross.

Easter Sunday celebrates Jesus's resurrection, which is a joyful victory over sin and death. Many people celebrate Easter by going to Church for the sunrise service, hunting for Easter eggs and even dyeing or decorating eggs.

Holy Week is an amazing and important time for prayer, repentance, and drawing closer to God.

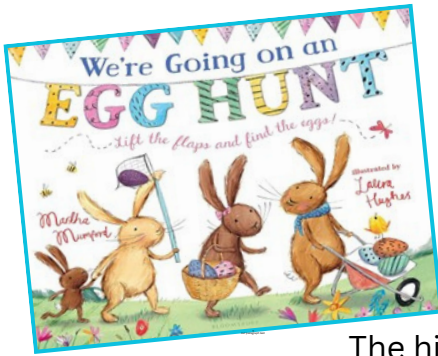
Common ways that people celebrate Easter, include:

Festive Easter Food

If you are invited to an Easter party and have no idea of what to take, here are some ideas. Main dishes you might expect to find at an Easter get-together include ham, pork loin, or maybe even lamb. Some popular sides could be deviled eggs, mac 'n' cheese, spring greens, roasted asparagus, and potato salad. If there is still room for dessert, delicious choices would be cookies, brownies, or a traditional lamb cake (baked in the shape of a lamb). One possibility that caught our eye (and made our mouths water) is a homemade carrot cake [see recipe below]. Hopefully we have given you some good inspiration. Enjoy your Easter get-together!



Eye-Opening Mouth Watering Carrot Cake

Ingredients

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- ½ teaspoon fine sea salt
- 1 ½ teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 ¼ cups vegetable oil
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup lightly packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4 large eggs, at room temperature
- 3 cups grated peeled carrots
- 1 cup coarsely chopped pecans
- ½ cup raisins

Instructions

1. Position a rack in the middle of the oven. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Grease two 9-inch round cake pans, line the bottom of each with parchment paper, or grease and flour the bottom and sides of both pans.
2. Whisk flour, baking soda, salt, and cinnamon together in a medium bowl until very well blended.
3. In a separate bowl, whisk the oil, granulated sugar, brown sugar, and vanilla. Add the eggs, one at a time, whisking after each one.
4. Switch to a large rubber spatula. Scrape the sides and bottom of the bowl, then add the dry ingredients in three parts, gently stirring until they disappear and the batter is smooth. Stir in the carrots, nuts, and raisins.
5. Divide the cake batter between the prepared cake pans. Bake until the tops of the cake layers are springy when touched and when a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean, approximately 35 to 45 minutes.
6. When cool, frost with a cream cheese or buttercream frosting. Decorate with piped orange and green frosting carrot shapes or trim with actually tiny carrots.

TACO BELL'S BIG GOTCHA!

April Fool's Day is the time you play practical jokes on everyone, sometimes to tease people, sometimes just to get a laugh. Taco Bell played one of these practical jokes on a lot of people during 1996. Here are the details:

Taco Bell announced with an advertisement that they planned to buy the Liberty Bell. The Liberty Bell is a national monument that is on public display in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Constructed in 1751, the bell was ordered to be made in honor of the 50th anniversary of William Penn's Charter of Privileges. The bell holds a significant place in America's history. Therefore, it is very understandable that the fact that this random food chain planned to purchase this landmark caused quite a bit of an uproar.

Taco Bell replaced full page advertisements in seven national newspapers announcing that not only would they be buying the Liberty Bell, but they would rename it as the Taco Bell Liberty Bell. Almost immediately after the advertisement was announced the National Park Service was flooded with calls from people who disapproved of the purchase.

Not everyone disliked this prank. A White House spokesperson said that the Taco Bell Liberty Bell was only the beginning and indicated that there were other corporate purchases of public landmarks. National Park Service officials, charged with the care and custody of the Liberty Bell, were shocked and blindsided. They no idea why this was happening. Eventually Taco Bell came clean about the prank and confessed that it was an elaborate April Fool's ruse. This prank is regarded as a marketing triumph. The ads cost Taco Bell \$300,000 yet generated \$25 million in free publicity. Thirty years later, The Taco Bell Liberty Bell joke is still spoken about 30 years later.

There are many April Fool's Day gags, but here are my top ten practical jokes for you to try. By the way, try to find all the uses of "creep" in this story.

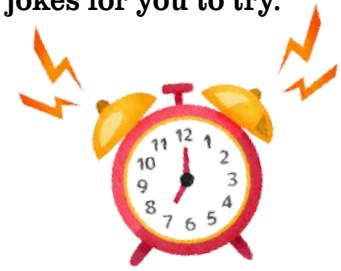
Number 10: The Alarm Clock Trick

Step 3: When someone walks below you, trickle the water, then... SPLASH!!!

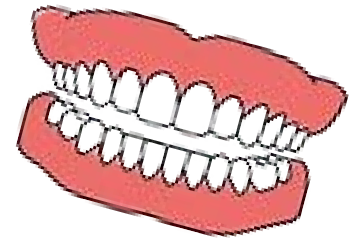
Number 7: The Chompers Trick

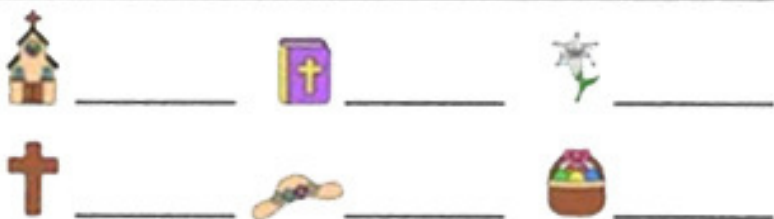
