September 11: Terror and Tragedy

One of the most tragic events in United States history is the terrorist attacks of 9/11 in 2001. Four plane crashes occurred on 9/11: Flight 11, Flight 175, Flight 77, and Flight 93. Flight 11 crashed into the north tower of the World Trade Center at 8:46 a.m. Sixteen minutes later Flight 175 hit the south tower and 9:03 a.m. One hour and 47 minutes later, both towers had collapsed and destroyed a dozen surrounding buildings, including each of the seven World Trade Center structures. At 9:37 a.m. Flight 77 nose dived into the Pentagon and caused a partial collapse. At 10:03 a.m. Flight 93 crashed into a field in Pennsylvania, instead of the White House or United States Capitol (its presumed targets). The reason Flight 93 struck the ground outside of Shanksville, Pennsylvania, was that the passengers realized they were on their way to the attack Washington, DC, and took control of the plane. Unfortunately, all the passengers on every flight that was hijacked that day had their life taken from them during the assaults. Hours after the attacks, the CIA determined that a terrorist group called Al-Qaeda was responsible for the attacks. In total 2,977 civilians were from a Christian perspective: murdered and 19 terrorists were killed in the day's events. Between 6,000 and 25,000 people were injured.


Upcoming home games are scheduled on September 19, 22, and 26. The Chargers will be on the road for a September 29 game,

On September 16, 1810, he rang his church's bell and delivered a speech now known as the Grito de Dolores (Cry of Dolores), demanding the end of Spanish rule. This started the brutal Mexican War of Independence, which lasted over a decade. On August 24, 1821, Spain withdrew and officially recognized Mexico as an independent country.

A country-wide holiday, the Independence Day celebration for many includes starting the day by wearing the Mexican flag colors of red, white, and green. Sugar gliders are small but cute animals. They are sometimes

referred to as lesser gliding opossums or sugar squirrels. Sugar gliders get their name because of the specialized flap connecting the front leg to the hind leg, giving them the ability to glide.

They are mammals. They have gray hair and a couple black stripes. They are very small. They are only 5 or 6 inches long and weigh between 4 and 6 ounces. They occasionally eat insects, mice, nuts, and other small mammals. Sugar gliders usually live for about 4 to 6 years.

Sugar gliders are able to glide up to 148 1/2 feet and have been observed to leap at and catch moths in flight. Females have a pouch on their belly in which they raise their young for ten weeks after birth. I hope you enjoyed learning about sugar gliders!
